

Dear Brothers & Sisters,

With a little, God does a lot! She only had a little oil left in the house, her husband was dead and the debt collector was on his way to take her sons as payment, when she met Elisha. Elisha tells her to go collect jars from her neighbors, and not just a few. Then shut yourself into your house and start filling jars. She does just that, and fills ALL the jars from her one small jar.

It struck me that when the woman asks for help, Elisha responds with, "Tell me what you have in your house." Elisha could have given her money to pay the debt or made the debt collector go away in miraculous way, but he didn't. He asked what she had, and then God multiplied her small amount of oil for her to use to pay the debt owed. Why deal with the problem that way? Could it be to show us that even with our meager resources, when offered to God in faith, He can accomplish great things?

I see that happening often at the Center of Hope. God uses the limited resources we have to provide warmth to those who live outside. He uses us as a catalyst to heal family relationships or guide guests to a church home. He uses us to pray and encourage those who are trying to find work and to help them get to work. The list can go on, and I'm sure as you reflect on your own life you will see how God multiplies what you have to offer.

I am excited to share that God has put it on the heart of one of our supporters to offer to help you multiply what you give with his own gift. We had not anticipated this possibility as he had never done this before. But, he has offered to match any gift over your usual yearly giving up to \$10,000. 

As eleven-year-old Kate climbed in the Family Visitation Center van for her weekly visit, she exclaimed, "Oh good! We're going home!" When the driver reminded her, they were going to the Family Visitation Center, Kate replied, "No. We're going home. We learned in school that home is where your family is together; and the Family Visitation Center is where my family is together. So, we're going home!"

You provide that *home* for Kate and more than 250 children like her each month with your financial investment in the Family Visitation Center. Since 2000, more than 4800 children have benefited from having a safe *home* where they can create positive memories with parent(s) – and the need continues to grow.

Consequently, the Family Visitation Center struggles financially to keep up with community needs. The gap between fees collected and actual expenses is \$50 per hour. Every \$100 donation to the Family Visitation Center provides two hours "home" for children who, otherwise, are at risk of going weeks without contact with their family. The extra help is especially needed since Catherine's daughter and grandson are currently living with her, stretching her meager food budget even further.



it. She says, "I appreciate all the people that donate food and money. The Food Bank is very important because there are many, many families out there — especially among the Native American people — that can benefit from this."



Without your kindness, we would not be able to provide food to individuals and families in need.



Shining a Light in the Darkness

The work of Feeding South Dakota wouldn't be possible without the support of friends like you and our agency partners who work the frontlines. One of our local partners in Rapid City is Holly Sortland, the pastor at Open Heart United Methodist Church.

As a pastor, I try to feed people's souls. But people's souls can't be fed if they're hungry.

Recognizing the need in their neighborhood, Holly's church started a monthly food pantry and meal. She says, "We're located within a one-mile radius of three Title 1

schools, meaning that at least forty percent of those kids are at or below the poverty line."

Holly and her church do more than just hand out food, they practice what she calls radical hospitality. "The congregation will come in and cook, and we serve a meal here. We have activities for children. We also have a free clothing store, so they can shop while they're waiting."

In addition to helping people who live nearby, part of the church's mission is to reach our homeless neighbors. She

says, "We serve a meal at the Cornerstone Mission once a month, and we always receive our food from Feeding South Dakota. That's been another great partnership."


One of the biggest challenges she sees is people who are too embarrassed to seek assistance. "There's no shame in asking for help or showing vulnerability. Anybody can be just one event — one accident — away from poverty. Any of us might need help one day." That's why Holly encourages her congregation and community to give generously in the fight against hunger.

"As a pastor, I try to feed people's souls. But people's souls can't be fed if they're hungry. Food is one of our most basic needs. If you want to reduce poverty, start at ground zero — making sure people are fed. I encourage people who give to attend a feeding event, so they can see peoples' eyes light up once they get that food."

Your selfless generosity is the reason Holly and our other 275 agency partners can get food into the hands of those who need it most. Thank you for your kindness and compassion to help our hungry neighbors.

Have you met Deb, aka the Spider Lady? Simply stop by a mobile pantry in Rapid City, and you're sure to see her smiling face. Deb earned her nickname from her Can-Am Spider she rides around town, which she covered with fake spiders. The only thing greater than her enthusiasm is her energy!

After retiring from the Air Force after 20 years, Deb first helped at one of our local food pantries. Before long, she became our go-to volunteer — doing everything from filling backpacks for kids to handing out food at mobile pantry events.

She says, "Before volunteering, I didn't realize there was this much need in South Dakota. This is the best nonpaying job I've had because of the handshakes and hugs ... people get so elated over just a can of soup. Everyone that comes through becomes extended family to me."

One of Deb's biggest passions is encouraging others to volunteer with her. "I'm always telling people, just take an hour out of your day and come help. Physically see what's going on — what your dollars are doing — and look at the people you fed today."

Eager to get back to her work at the food bank, Spider Lady shares one last thought before bouncing back into action. "I'm passionate about volunteering. They rely on me, and I won't let them down."

The holidays are some of the best times to make memories and enjoy the little moments with our families and friends. However, for others, it can be a quick and cold walk down memory lane of heartache and yearning for loved ones lost. It had me thinking: what is in a memory?

Is it a smell, a glimpse or a flash back of the moment, or a specific place that brings you back to better days? So many of my memories are triggered by all three of these things. At the Furniture Mission I have found that we are the collectors of memories. Except as the memories or donations are captured, we hold them tightly for only a moment until they are on to their next adventure.



"Gifts to Phase II of Glory House Apartments make a powerful impact on the lives of clients who need an opportunity to re-establish themselves as an active and vital part of the Sioux Falls area workforce. This year, it has particular meaning. As the 2019 year comes to a close, many opportunities for our clients, and others, unfold. Our Sioux Falls Chamber of Commerce Community Appeals Capital Campaign officially kicked off on November 6th, 2019. This campaign, approved for \$1.35 million of the needed \$7.5 million, will eventually provide up to 72 individuals the opportunity to live in clean, sober, and affordable housing. Built on the site of the former City Ice Skating Rink, it is in an ideal location. Being next door to the Glory House, an accredited substance abuse treatment facility, tenants will have easy access to substance abuse and mental health counseling, case management and employment assistance. It is housing, but it is MUCH more than that. It is expanding the continuum of care to permanent housing coupled with support services.

The first 25 efficiency apartments, Phase One, are now complete. Already we are working to qualify potential tenants. With rents being less than \$600/month, (utilities included!) it offers an affordable safe space for those who need and want it. But the ripple effect goes far beyond the individual tenant. A stable person provides healthier family support. Employers have an employee who comes to work. Our courts and jails see fewer individuals return over and over. The community gains a citizen that wants an opportunity to succeed.

It certainly "tis the season..." I know that our mission, "Helping people claim their lives with Christian compassion, resources and support" comes to life in each of us that work here on a daily basis. This season, we all have the opportunity to expand our mission to those that need permanent housing and support services. Together, staff, clients and community, we can make a difference. It is our time.

100+ MEN WHO CARE IN SIOUX FALLS

100+ Men Who Care is a national organization whose purpose is to support local communities by supporting local non-profit organizations. With the help of Glory House Board Member, Mike Johnson, Glory House was one of three groups chosen to present their case for funding to the quarterly meeting of the Sioux Empire chapter of Men Who Care. Former clients Dante Gaskin and Sophie Griffith joined Board Members Terryl Cadwell, Ryan Kolbeck and staff member Nicki Dvorak to give a five minute sales pitch for Glory House. They chose to model their presentation on the television show "The Shark Tank". The members of 100+ Men Who Care each came to the meeting with a check for \$100.00.

At the end of the presentations, the Men Who Care members deliberated in order to choose which two groups would receive 10% each of the donations and which group would take home 80%.



Besides Glory House, the contenders were Teach for America, and a halfway house for juvenile offenders. Glory House was one of the 10% recipients and received a check for \$1045.20.

Glory House will use this money to develop a mentoring program to assist 12 new Glory House residents who need help transitioning from prison to a less restrictive environment.

The money will be used to train mentors, purchase restaurant gift cards to reward participants, provide lunch to coaches at their meetings, and for emergency expenses. Coaches and mentors will be paired based on similar backgrounds and life experiences. This mentoring will provide one more avenue for support, advice, and pro-social contact to help our clients in succeed in society.






One of the campers wrote:

"Pastor, tell her Truth!" by Fred Wilgenburg



As the chaplain at Smithfield Foods in Sioux Falls, I was recently in "5th floor, pork cut" (*There are eight floors in this particular section of the massive, 100+ year old packing plant.*), talking to a young woman who is orig-

inally of Nepal. I asked her about her nursing classes, which she takes during her off-hours. As we chatted, there came another woman, a Christian originally from Ethiopia. She pointed at the other woman, as she spoke above the production noise, "Pastor, she doesn't think Heaven is real, and she doesn't believe in God!



Tell her truth!" I encouraged her to go back to her neighboring station, as I would soon visit with her. Naturally, the first woman, a Hindu, was annoyed by the other, so I apologized on behalf of my fellow Christian and we continued our brief chat.

I actually applaud the Christian woman for her fervor in wanting her co-worker to know Truth, though more sensitivity would be helpful. Eventually, I circled around and we talked. I told her that the non-Christian woman has Christian Nepali friends, including her best friend who also works at the plant, and that nearly all of the 500+ Christian Nepali people in Sioux Falls were Hindu or Buddhist in the past. They came to know Jesus through the warm interactions, prayers and kindness of Christians. A week later, we met during a break so I could show her what I learned at a recent Gospel Conversation training event. As I'm working on it, so I hope she also is prepared to share effectively at the right moments, and by the Holy Spirit's lead.

(If you are interested in learning about the 15-second testimony or the 3-minute presentation of the Gospel taught at the event mentioned above, and having easy, natural conversations which may lead to those opportunities, please let me know and I'll send you some links and other information.)

Many people who are originally of other countries are accustomed to spiritual dialogue. My friends Maru, Abidela, and Mohammad "Natnael", all originally of Ethiopia, and all who were former Muslims, each came to receive Jesus as their Savior while in Africa as kind Christian neighbors or friends patiently discussed the Gospel with them over tea. That motivated them to do the same, which is quite obvious if you interact with them; they are open about their faith, and they will want to know where you stand. In fact, though they appreciate much about the U.S., they miss the aspect of Africa where people had more time for good, deep dialogue, and where there was more interest in becoming well-acquainted with others.

An observation I have made, of myself as a city outreach pastor, and of churches, is that we sometimes overly-calculate and -consider when it comes to sharing the Gospel. For example, in Gospel outreach ministry, we often first seek to meet felt-needs, and then hopefully, as a relationship might develop or respect is earned, we might get to pray for the other person, and then, if the opportune time arrives, we might talk clearly about the Gospel. In church, many resources are contributed to developing programs—>

taught me, and which many of my friends originally of other countries know, people first and foremost need Jesus. As well, as people are all made in God's image, they are spiritual and therefore naturally inclined to think about spiritual things. Even if they do not seem interested even in sharing a prayer need, or to answer a follow-up question like, "Well, let me ask you another way, if God could do a miracle for you, what would you want Him to do," they usually won't be offended by your kind approach and respectful

presence. I'm learning this by experience as one of the

event's teachers reminded us that, like training for an


athletic event, it is important to do "reps"—repetition.

And, people might not show it in the moment, but receiving Christian kindness and interest will likely be

that teach about the Gospel, or to form committees to do evangelism. But sometimes, though wellintended, the main thing that a person needs—an organic, personal explanation at the right moment that God profoundly cares about and loves them-goes unmet as it is lost in the shuffle of programming. Rather, why don't we consider starting with helping a person meet their deepest need—a personal relationship with God, and then perhaps also help them with other, felt-needs? Is that more direct approach avoided because the conversation may seem weird, unnatural, or disrespectful?

What is New Roots Ministry? It's "a springboard for immigrants & their churches." This is done through workplace chaplaincy (both as Fred is chaplain for 17 hours/week at Smithfield Foods & as we train & place bi-lingual chaplains on commercial farms), through Timothy Leadership Training, through hosting special educational events, through empowering refugee/immigrant pastors, leaders, and their churches, through offering unique Service Opportunities—serve in, or visit, stores owned by refugees or immigrants, then hear their stories, and through helping people navigate the American system and strategically achieve their goals, like education.





Our November 2 event, "Looking Back, Yet Looking Forward: Immigrant Stories," was our best yet! Good attendance was complemented by a variety of ethnic food & beverages, and learning from 6 speakers about migration from their home countries and how we Americans can better receive newcomers.

Recently a mom of a 6-year-old called. Her child has a complex seizure disorder, uses a feeding tube for nutrition, and language and cognitive delays. SD Parent Connection was able to guide her in working with their school team on a care plan to address the child's health concerns, as well as an Individual Education Plan to address learning challenges. The broad expertise found at SD Parent Connection helped this mom address the multiple complex needs for her child.
